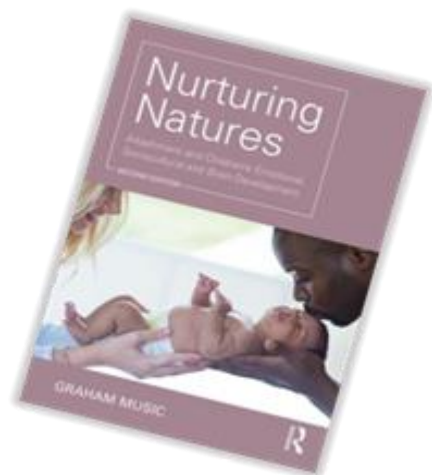


Perinatal and Infant Mental Health Services - Helen Mayo House annual conference
