Clinical Integration at the Local Level Forum

Summary Report | May 2019

It has long been identified that multidisciplinary team work results in improved quality of care and health outcomes for patients. Providing opportunities for health professions to integrate in a professional, clinical and systemic manner enhances person-centred care and therefore improve a person's overall well-being.

Adelaide PHN currently provides a range of supports for primary health care providers to support their ability to work as part of a primary health care system to provide the right care in the right time and the right place. This work is underpinned by Adelaide PHN's Integrated Care Framework.

In May 2019, Adelaide PHN facilitated the Clinical Integration at the Local Level Forum. The purpose of the forum was to bring health professional organisations together to consider how to enhance delivery of person centred, integrated care to meet the health needs of the community.

Health professional organisations were invited to the Forum of which 10 organisations attended (refer to Appendix A: Health Professional Organisations). In total 18 professionals attended the Forum participating in a workshop to discuss clinical integration. Feedback regarding the Forum was very positive (refer to Appendix B: Participants' Feedback)

Workshop Outcomes

Participants were asked to brainstorm their understanding of clinical integration and how to work together using a case study. The following themes were identified:

- Clinical governance
- Effective communication
- Collaboration
- Better access
- Knowing and understanding the expertise of other professionals

Proposed ideas to enable clinical integration included:

- Funding model to support integration
- Mechanism for integration to be easier

What can we do?

Following discussion participants highlighted the following strategies that will support clinical integration:

- A single e-communication platform be developed to encourage communication between health professional
- Explore Health Fusion Team Challenges: provide training for undergraduate students to know what other do
- Explore the opportunities of collaborating with GPs at the regional level



Where to from here

Participants expressed that communication and engagement continue with Adelaide PHN. The following actions were highlighted

- Participants receive a summary of Forum
- An environmental scan be conducted on collaborations that are working between professions and who is doing what
- Identify areas where integration has worked well
- Start small at a local level
